But behind that simple movement is a technology quietly keeping track of the campus. A new layer of campus security exists with the turnstile system. Why the campus needed smarter gates.

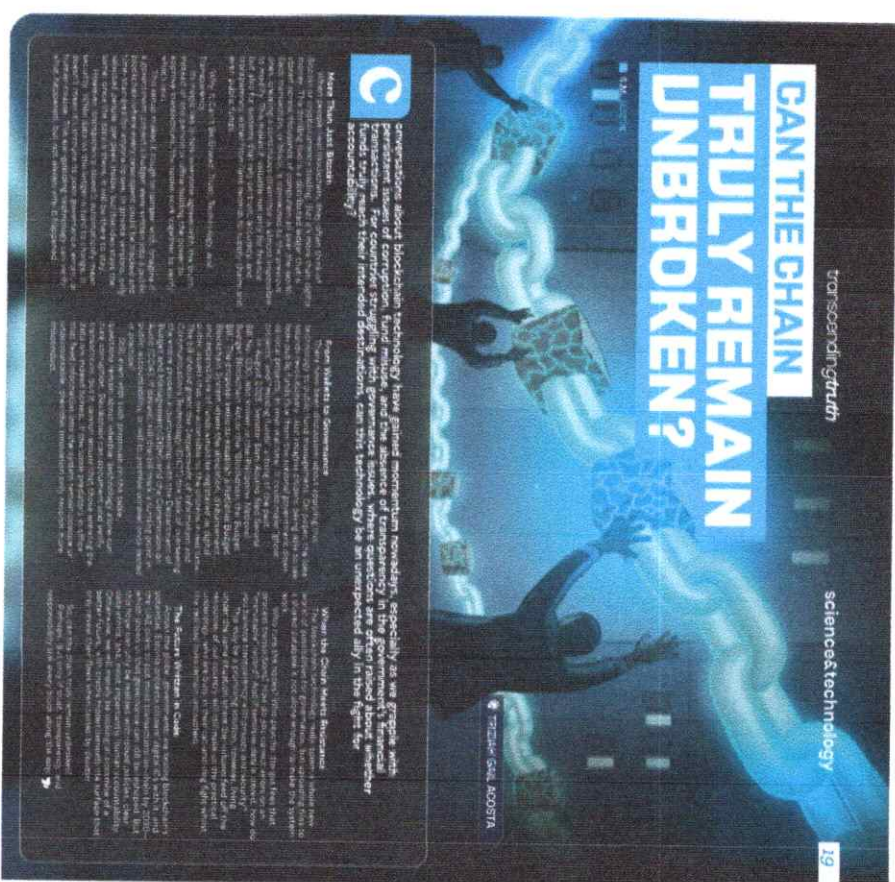

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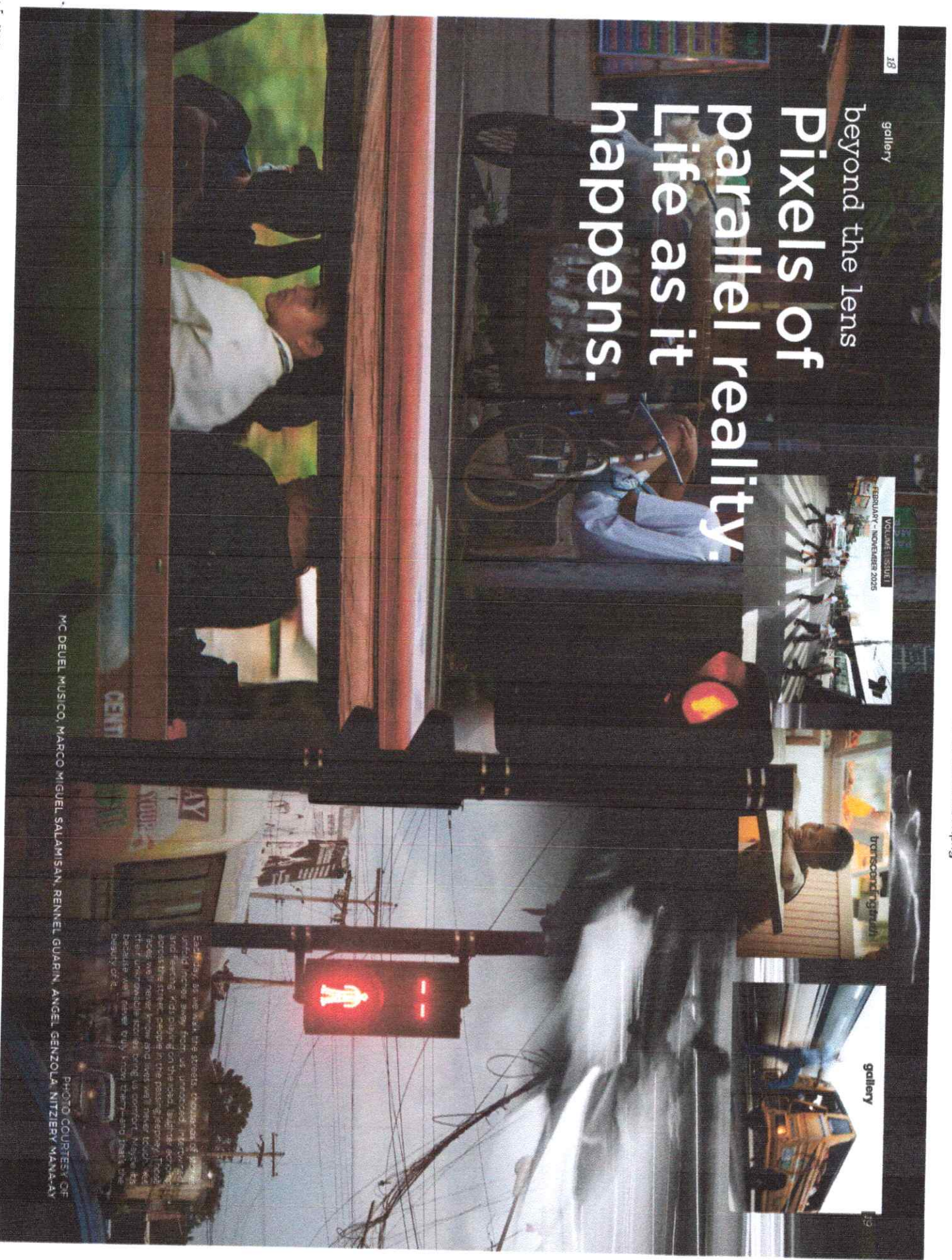

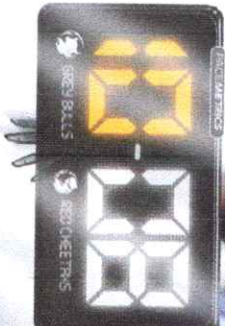

Gorst shot-for-shot until the final rack. With the score locked at 4-4, Manas executed a flawless run-out, snatching the final 9-ball to complete the monumental upset and ignite massive celebrations on the Asian bench.

The victory dealt a psychological blow to Team ROW with Gorst's defeat signaling deep trouble for their side. Meanwhile, Team Asia's unity and preparation have powered them to dominate every match so far.

"To get a win over World Number One, someone I really look up to, is crazy. I'm proud, but I'm not done yet. I want to help Asia finish this the right way," said Manas.

With a commanding 6-0 lead, Team Asia now sits firmly in control as ROW scrambles to recover before the competition slips away.

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
